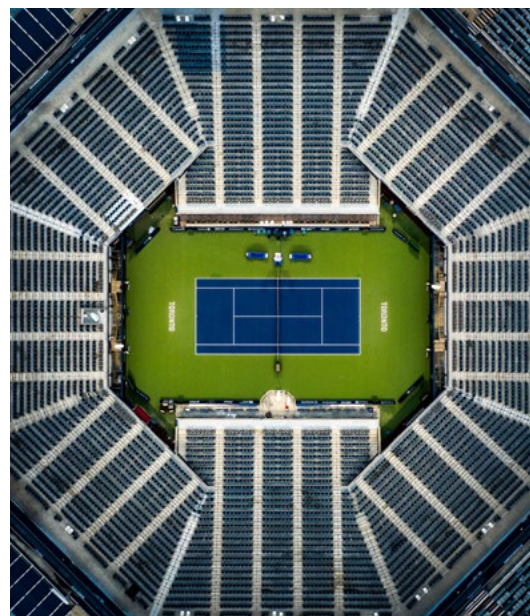
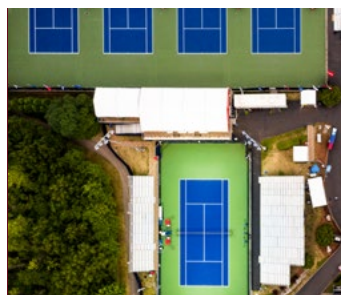
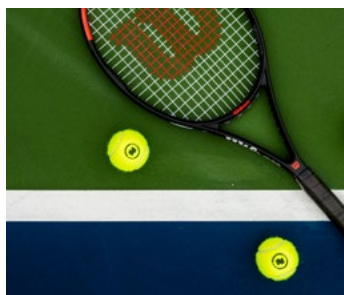


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WELCOME MESSAGE



Welcome to Tennis Canada's 2022 Annual Report. I am delighted, as Chair of the Board, to pen this welcome remark, and to thank a wonderful team for an incredible year.

Before I begin to recap the year for Tennis Canada and tennis in Canada, I'd first like to acknowledge my predecessor. During Jennifer Bishop's time as Chair, our organization experienced incredible success, including celebrating a first Grand Slam singles champion as well as the implementation of countless off-court initiatives to cement our place as a world-leading tennis nation, including in crucial areas such as Gender Equity and Safe Sport. Fortunately, we were able to continue that momentum in 2022 and, having navigated the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic, one of the most challenging times in our organization's history, we flourished and reached new heights last year. Heights unmatched in our 133-year existence. I would also like to thank our departing board members, Marcie Ellen Jackson, Derrick Rowe and Mike Tevlin, each of whom have contributed to the achievements of Tennis Canada, and welcome our newest additions, James G. Bagnell, Mohamed Ismath, and Ula Ubani, who have already been active on our Board since last May.

It's hard to start anywhere other than the incredible Davis Cup championship, the first in our country's history, orchestrated by an experienced Team Captain Frank Dancevic and inspirational players in Félix Auger-Aliassime, Denis Shapovalov, Vasek Pospisil, Gabriel Diallo and Alexis Galarneau. Their triumph was years in the making having followed in the footsteps of the many players that have gone before. Congratulations to them and every tennis fan in Canada, who can now legitimately claim the mantle of World Champions. On the women's side, our Billie Jean King Cup team put on a clinic in Vancouver last April to secure a 4-0 victory over Latvia and advance to the Finals in Glasgow, Scotland. Although they were knocked out after a round-robin loss to eventual champions Switzerland, no one would bet against Heidi El Tabakh and her talented team going all the way in 2023.

On the WTA and ATP Tours, our athletes continued to excel in 2022. Leylah Annie Fernandez sealed her second WTA title by repeating in Monterrey and reached a career-high No. 13 in August. Her run to the quarter-finals of Roland-Garros was a particular highlight. Bianca Andreescu reached the final in Bad Homburg, while Gabriela Dabrowski continued to



show why she's one of the best doubles players in the world, winning titles in Madrid, Tokyo and Chennai and finishing as runner-up in Rome and San Diego. Meanwhile, Rebecca Marino's continued comeback also saw her compete in the main draw at all four Grand Slams. On the men's side, Auger-Aliassime won his first four ATP titles, including three in consecutive weeks, and secured his spot at the year-end ATP Finals. Shapovalov reached two finals, in Vienna and Seoul, and remained inside the ATP's Top 20 for almost the entire year, while Pospisil continued to be a consistent performer at the highest level and won two Challengers, including in Drummondville. I would also like to reserve special congratulations for Victoria Mboko who, at 16-years-old, won her very first professional title at the Saskatoon Challenger in July. Fellow young Canadian Diallo also collected his first professional winner's trophy at the Granby National Bank Championships.

It was a great pleasure to see the National Bank Open presented by Rogers, the 'engine' of Tennis Canada, return as full-capacity events in Montreal and Toronto in 2022. Both cities broke attendance and sales records, and fans were able to watch the best players from across the world at IGA Stadium and Sobeys Stadium, marking the first year our Toronto event has been hosted at the venue under its new guise following an expansion of Tennis Canada's partnership agreement with Empire. Our tournaments are on firm footing having secured major funding of \$9.3 million in Toronto and \$10 million in Montreal, granted by the Government of Canada as part of the Major Festivals and Events Support Initiative (MFESI). Following COVID-19, these investments will enable event organizers to safely welcome visitors and be better positioned for long-term success, while providing spillover economic and job benefits to businesses across the region.

Off the court, Tennis Canada launched several new initiatives in 2022 that we can all be proud of. Mental Timeout, a game-changing wellness project focusing on the mental health of all those involved in tennis in Canada, was brought to life at the National Bank Open, including the Positive Court Pledge initiative. We also had the privilege of hosting the inaugural UNMATCHED Gender Equity in Sports Conference featuring tennis legend Billie Jean King and presented by National Bank, bringing together leaders, influencers, athletes, advocates, and academics from across Canada and the world to celebrate the place of women and girls in sport. Our capacity building efforts were also accelerated as the first three Year-Round Community Tennis Court projects were completed in partnership with Rogers in Markham (ON), Ancaster (ON) and Calgary (AB), with Waterloo (QC) set to follow along with four further new projects ready for the 2023-24 winter season. We also launched the National Bank Play Your Court Program through which local communities across the country can apply to receive funding to revitalize their outdoor community tennis courts, with the first completed project taking place in the City of Brampton.

On behalf of the Board, I would like to reiterate that tennis in Canada has never been stronger or had more momentum thanks to the inspired leadership of Michael Downey and all our colleagues at Tennis Canada. We are thoroughly looking forward to what 2023 has to bring as we continue to fulfill Tennis Canada's vision to be a world-leading tennis nation and mission to lead the growth of tennis in Canada.

Community Tennis

In 2022, Tennis Canada worked with several grassroots tennis organizations to offer free tennis programming to kids from underserved communities. Over 1,000 kids were reached through these organizations. Our grassroots partners offer each child at least six weeks of tennis programming to ensure all participants had learned the fundamentals and would be able to enjoy tennis as a sport for life.



Key Highlights

Camp for New Canadians:

- 50 kids between the ages of seven and 14 joined for a full week of camp.
- The camp was open to families who immigrated to Canada within the past 10 years.
- Kids from 22 different countries took part in the camp.
- Philpott Children's Tennis supplied coaching services. Many of the coaches are graduates of the Philpott Tennis Leadership Program and are first-generation Canadians.
- Each camper received a tennis racquet and tennis balls to take home. The campers will continue to receive free tennis lessons through Philpott Children's Tennis and Jane and Finch Community Tennis Association.



Kids' Tennis

Both the Rogers Rookie Tour and the Orange-Green Ball (U9/U10) Circuit returned for 2022. The Rogers Rookie Tour provides kids with their first match play experience, while the Orange-Green Ball Circuit provides young tennis players the opportunity to play competitive tennis in a fun environment.

University Tennis

The 13th edition of the Canadian University Tennis Championships returned to the National Bank Open grounds for the first time since 2019. Hosting the University Championships alongside the professional WTA/ATP events ensures tennis has one of the most unique university sports experiences in the country.

— Women's Draw

The University of Alberta Golden Bears claimed the championship title with a convincing 6-1 victory over the University of Toronto Varsity Blues. This was the University of Alberta's third consecutive title in a row, which is a new record for university tennis in Canada.

— Men's Draw

This year marked the first time in program history that the University of British Columbia Thunderbirds qualified for a National Championship. Their Cinderella story didn't end there, as they pulled off an impressive 4-3 win over the Université de Montréal to clinch the 2022 University Championship crown.

Regional Championships



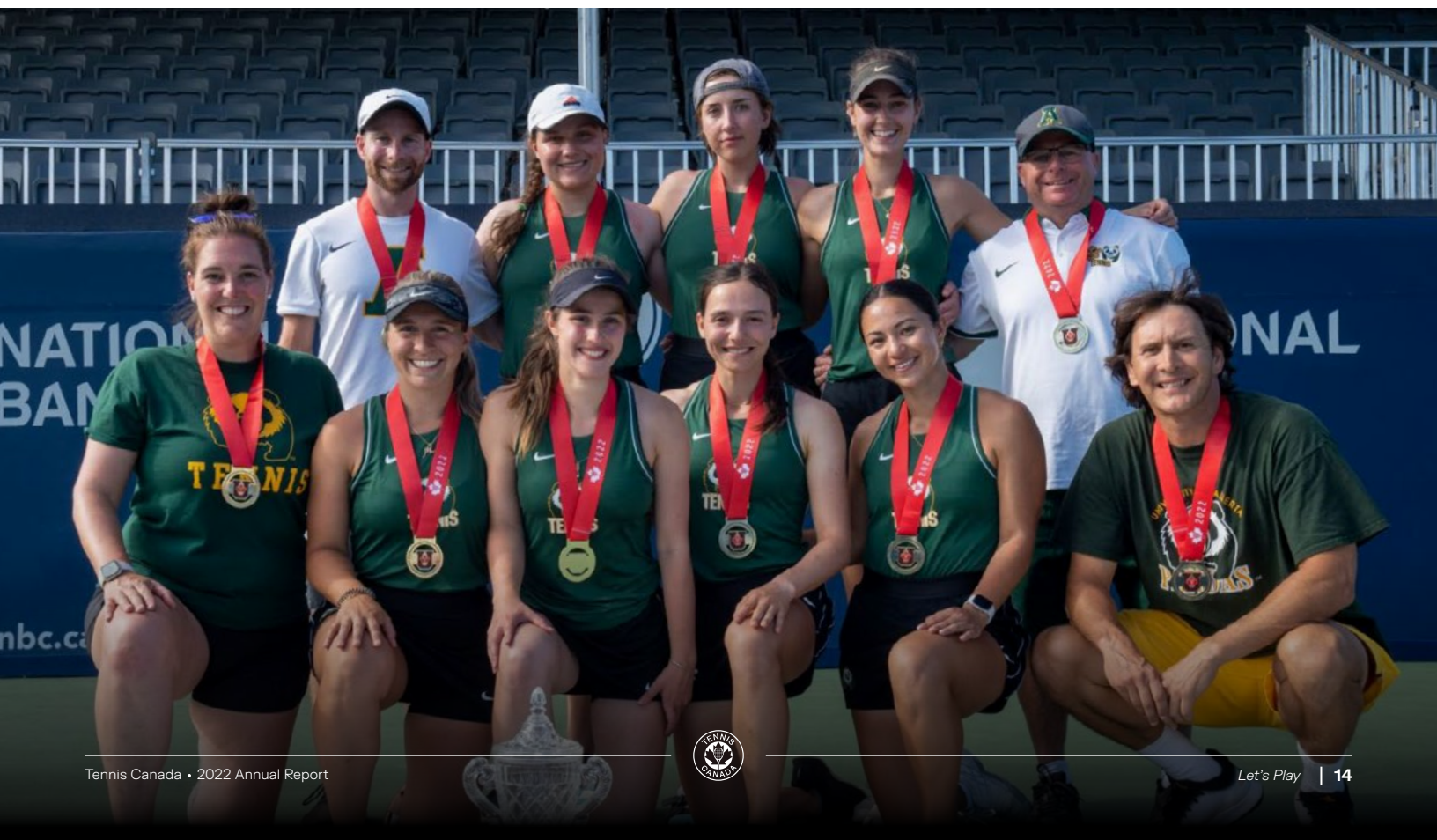
In the lead-up to the National Championships, regional university tennis returned for the 2021-22 season, with 25 universities, 45 teams and 433 players competing across the four regions.

Wheelchair Tennis

The Birmingham National Wheelchair Tennis Championships returned to IGA Stadium in Montreal, Quebec. Thomas Venos of British Columbia and Ontario native Anne-Marie Dolinar swept the podium, winning both the singles and doubles titles in their respective divisions. Other doubles winners were Barry Henderson and Natalia Lanucha

In addition to the men's and women's singles and doubles draws, the 2022 Birmingham Nationals had its first-ever junior division. John Chen, the talented youngster from British Columbia, won all three of his matches to take home inaugural title.

Moreover, Canadian wheelchair tennis flourished in 2022 on the international stage, with numerous players reaching new career milestones.

Key Highlights

- Rob Shaw qualified for his first Grand Slam appearance at the US Open in September as well as the year-end Singles and Doubles Masters.
- All four of the players on the National team reached career-high rankings: Thomas Venos (No. 53), Barry Henderson (No. 84), Rob Shaw (No. 7 – Quads), and Mitch McIntyre (No. 13 – quads)





Masters Tennis

Masters Tennis, formerly known as Seniors Tennis, made a resounding comeback in 2022 after a two-year absence due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Canada was well represented at the ITF World Tennis Masters Tour – World Team & Individual Championships. The 2022 events took place in Palm Beach County, Florida, and in Lisbon, Portugal.

Additionally, back on home soil, the Steve Stevens Senior Nationals returned to Vancouver and was the highlight of the 2022 Masters calendar. Just over 500 players competed at five wonderful venues in Vancouver. The Vancouver Lawn Tennis and Badminton Club along with the Arbutus Club, the Jericho Tennis Club, Richmond Country Club, and the Richmond Tennis Club did an incredible job of welcoming all the players to the city.

Key Highlights

- Women's and Men's Over 70 teams captured Copper medals, finishing fourth in the World Team competition.
- Keith Porter won the Men's Over 70 Singles World Championships, becoming the first Canadian to clinch a Singles World Championships title since 2016.
- Erin Boynton was a semi-finalist in the Women's Over 60 singles event.

Facilities Programs

Making tennis more accessible for Canadians is among Tennis Canada's top priorities and the organization was very proactive in accelerating its capacity building efforts in 2022 via two key initiatives, the **Year-Round Community Tennis Courts Program** presented by Rogers and the National Bank **Play Your Court Program**.

Year-Round Community Tennis Courts Program Presented by Rogers

Funded jointly by Tennis Canada and Rogers, the \$5.6 million program will make year-round tennis a reality for Canadians and help foster increased participation amongst youth with the aim of building 160 year-round courts at up to 30 facilities by 2029. For each project, Rogers generously provides \$200,000 of seed money.

The investment addresses the fact that, when the program initially launched, Canada fell behind other leading tennis nations in providing access to the sport 12 months a year, with only 750 publicly accessible covered courts across the country. That's just one year-round court for every 50,000 people.

Having unveiled the first completed projects at Premier Racquet Clubs (**Markham**, Ontario), Ancaster Tennis Club (**Hamilton**, Ontario) and OSTEN & Victor Alberta Tennis Center (**Calgary**, Alberta) in 2022, the program has already delivered 11 year-round tennis courts, serving approximately 2.5 million Canadians and collectively providing an additional



1,680 hours of court time per week to their constituents during the winter months. All three facilities saw a strong uptake in winter court bookings and membership enrollment for the new indoor season. Ground was also broken on a fourth project at Club de Tennis François Godbout (Waterloo, Quebec) which is scheduled for completion in the fall 2023.

National Bank Play Your Court

In August 2022, National Bank and Tennis Canada joined forces to officially launch the National Bank Play Your Court Program, aiming to make tennis more accessible for all Canadians. There is a growing demand for tennis and a need to update many outdoor community courts.

As such, the program's focus is to work with municipalities to give new life to community courts that already exist by

providing local communities across the country the chance to apply to receive funding to do so. In total, the initiative makes available \$3 million that will be directed to more than 100 courts across the country by 2030.

In September, The City of Brampton along with National Bank and Tennis Canada revealed the City's new National Bank Tennis Courts, the first project of the program. In addition to the resurfacing of four tennis courts, the final court surface will be added prior to the start of the 2023 playing season. The revamped facilities will include new posts, nets, court perimeter fencing, gates and signage for the duration of the agreement.





Tennis Professionals Association (TPA) - Coaching

In 2022, over 50 in-person courses (including instructor and CP1 courses) were delivered across the country by the Provincial and Territorial Tennis Associations (PTTA) with over 550 participants being certified. Among these courses, the first Inspire through Sport instructor course was concluded in June 2022. The program, which took place over eight months, enabled 12 young women to obtain their instructor certification and develop into leaders in the tennis industry. On the High-Performance side, 17 coaches received their Coach 2 designation in 2022.

The TPA hosted eight online professional development pipeline webinar events geared towards High-Performance development in collaboration with the national centre coaches. In total, there were 564 registrants for the pipeline webinars. In addition, the TPA hosted four Cardio Tennis Training Courses, which included 71 participants, and two doubles workshops, with 80 participants in total divided between Toronto and Montreal.

At year-end, TPA membership stood at 3,705 – an increase of over 8% from the year prior and its highest number to date – of which roughly 3,033 were in good standing, meaning they had up-to-date certification and had completed all the necessary safe sport requirements.

Those safe sport requirements include a background check and the full completion of a Respect in Sport module. In total, 81% of coaches working at year-round, indoor facilities were in good standing by the end of the year.

The Tennis Professionals Association (TPA) and Pickleball Canada Organization (PCO) joined forces to develop pickleball coaches across Canada in September of 2021. The pathway seeks to develop enthusiastic pickleball players into excellent coaches to grow the game in Canada.

To date there have been 51 “Level One: Introduction to Pickleball” courses across the country. With increased interest from the Pickleball community to develop this program further, “Level Two: Developing Recreational Coaches”. Since September 2022, the TPA has executed 5 Level Two courses and has certified 593 coaches across both levels.

With a full calendar of events in 2022, the Officiating team had a very busy year supporting both professional and national tournaments.



Women in Officiating

2022 saw a focus on Women in Officiating and several successful initiatives were launched to increase the number of women in the officiating system and to provide development opportunities to the women already working as officials.

Introductory clinics for women were held in Vancouver to coincide with the Billie Jean King Cup tie in April. Following the success of that clinic, another was held during the National Bank Open WTA event in Toronto.

Participants were given the opportunity to meet some of the world's top officials working on the tours, treated to a behind-the-scenes tour and provided with on-court training and mentorship to start their officiating journey. These two clinics have seen the highest retention rate of any in the last few years and, as a result, women officials now make up 45% of the total officials in British Columbia, and 40% in Ontario.

Anne Bees and Kasia Radwan-Cho, who have been leading these initiatives, were invited to share the learning and experiences from these clinics with the ITF Advantage All symposium delegates at the Billie Jean King Cup by Gainbridge Finals in Glasgow, Scotland in November.

The Tevlin Challenger, an ITF Women's \$60,000 event held in October, was staffed entirely by women officials, a first for Tennis Canada.

Development

For the first time since 2010, in October, Tennis Canada hosted an ITF White Badge officiating school, offering all three modules, namely Chair Umpire, Chief Umpire and Referee. These schools, held over five days and attended by officials from around the world, are intended for officials with proven ability and experience of working at professional level tournaments. All the Canadian delegates passed their examinations, resulting in three newly-certified Referees, three Chiefs of Officials and two Chair Umpires.

In addition to supporting all the national and international events held at home, there was Canadian officiating representation at all four Grand Slams, and officials participated in exchanges with Qatar, Poland and Mexico. Canadian officials benefit from the knowledge of overseas officials sharing their expertise when they visit Canada and gaining this experience abroad is invaluable.

Gender Equity

After securing a 10-year partnership with National Bank in 2021 with a proportionate amount of the investment earmarked for advancing the participation and retention of women and girls in tennis, Tennis Canada realized important milestones in 2022 towards gender equity in tennis.

Gender Equity in Sports Conference

On August 10, Tennis Canada and National Bank hosted the inaugural UNMATCHED Gender Equity in Sports Conference. Part of the equity strategy announced by Tennis Canada and National Bank in 2021, the conference featured tennis legend and icon Billie Jean King and brought leaders, influencers, athletes, advocates, and academics from across Canada and the world to celebrate the place of women and girls in sport.

King, a former World No. 1, is one of the founding members of the Women's Tennis Association (WTA) and a lifelong Gender Equity in Sport Advocate. She delivered a keynote address alongside Sportsnet's Evanka Osmak as Emcee during a fireside chat. In addition, the UNMATCHED Gender Equity in Sports Conference hosted several athletes and speakers discussing a wide range of topics that affect gender equity in sport including a panel on the topic of mental health.

A new role: Director, Women and Girls Advancement

In 2022, Tennis Canada created the position of Director of Women and Girls Advancement, a new role to specifically help the organization advance gender equity across multiple pillars and grow the participation of women and girls in tennis.

In collaboration with Eva Havaris, Vice-President of Tennis Participation and Partnerships, the new director, Terri Temelini will operationalize Tennis Canada's new gender equity strategy, building on the foundational work that has been accomplished in the last two years. She will also look to increase opportunities for women in leadership in tennis and expand their visibility throughout Canada, while striving to create inclusive environments within the sport where women and girls can thrive.



Valérie Tétreault, New National Bank Open Tournament Director in Montreal

Last October, Eugène Lapierre, a name synonymous with tennis in Québec, Canada, and around the world for more than three decades, announced that he was stepping away from his role as Tournament Director of the National Bank Open presented by Rogers in Montréal. He passed the reins to Valérie Tétreault, previously Director of Communications at Tennis Canada and a respected TV sports commentator and former professional tennis player.

By virtue of her appointment, she became the first ever woman to hold the title of NBO Tournament Director in Montréal. Born in Saint-Jean-sur-Richelieu, Québec, Valérie is a former professional tennis player, reaching the ranking of world No. 112 in 2010 and having earned a total of 13 junior national titles. A member of the Canadian Billie Jean King Cup team from 2007 to 2010, she retired at the end of 2010 at only 22 years of age. Valérie Joined Tennis Canada in 2011 as a Communications Coordinator, earning a promotion to Communications Director in 2018.

Leadership Representation at Tennis Canada

Last year, Tennis Canada also unveiled other changes within its leadership structure, with the promotion of Anne Belliveau to the position of Chief Revenue and Marketing Officer, the selection of Marie-Renée Boisclair to the position of Chief Financial Officer, and the addition of Annie Blanchette to the role of Vice-President, People & Culture. These important changes brought balance to the leadership representation on the Senior management team, which is now composed of an equal number of men and women (four on each side).



Mental Timeout

Tennis Canada announced in July the launch of Mental Timeout, a game-changing wellness project focusing on the mental health of all those involved in tennis in Canada. With 2019 US Open champion Bianca Andreescu as its first ambassador, Mental Timeout is a suite of initiatives to support Tennis Canada's commitment to improving the wellbeing of tennis players of all ages and levels, and to ensuring a safe, healthy, and supportive environment for the future of the sport.

The project took shape based on two commitments: one that Tennis Canada makes as an institution towards the future of the sport, and a commitment that Tennis Canada seeks from everyone during tennis events in Canada. It was brought to life on site at the 2022 National Bank Open presented by Rogers in Toronto and Montreal and showcased two main initiatives: the **Positive Court Pledge** and **Tennis Therapy**.



Positive Court Pledge – A commitment by all

National Bank Open ticket buyers, tournament staff, volunteers, media, and players, as well as those following on social media around the world, were invited to sign The Positive Court Pledge – a written commitment to ensure a positive environment for all athletes performing in Canada, making them feel supported and uplifted. This pledge is a way to promote a safe environment, but also to break the taboo, and open a discussion, about the importance of mental health in sports.

Tennis Therapy – Tennis helping tennis

The Tennis Therapy initiative included a number of creative additions during the National Bank Open that aim to minimize the stress experienced by players: Meditation zones, a curated musical "Timeout Playlist" and 1:1 access to mental health experts. Moreover, a panel discussion around mental health in tennis also took place in Toronto on August 10 and finally, family fun activities were offered during 407 ETR Family Weekend and IGA Family Weekend in Toronto and Montreal, including yoga sessions.

A Commitment for a Long-Term Strategy

Tennis Canada pledged in 2022 a commitment for future Mental Timeout initiatives to continue the focus on mental health and the betterment of the sport. The long-term vision of the project is perfectly aligned with Tennis Canada's safe sport initiatives and our purpose: to improve the lives of Canadians through tennis.

As part of this strategy, Tennis Canada has engaged with several partners including Gameplan, the Canadian Olympic Committee, the Canadian Paralympic Committee, Own the Podium, Sport Canada, Canadian Centre for Mental Health and Sport (CCMHS) and the University of Ottawa to provide services, support, education and develop skills to lead a balanced life.





Safe Sport

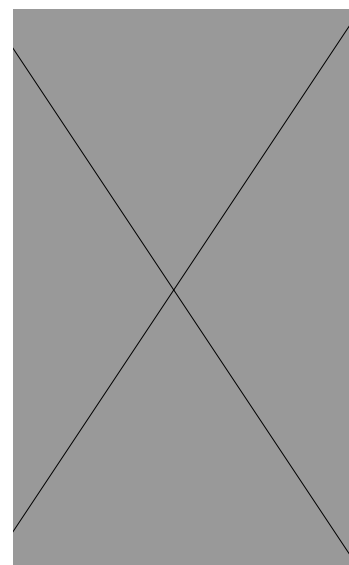


Fostering a safe and inclusive environment for everyone in tennis remains a priority for Tennis Canada. As such, in 2022, the organization's Safe Sport department focused on the following initiatives:

National Communication Campaign

Tennis Canada, in collaboration with the Provincial and Territorial Tennis Associations and the TPA, developed a campaign to raise awareness of the importance of hiring an actively certified coach. This campaign featured a QR code whereby participants/parents can access the TPA database to ensure their coach is actively certified.

Expansion of the Tennis Canada Code of Conduct and Independent Mechanism to Investigate Complaints

As Tennis Canada works towards becoming a signatory of Abuse Free Sport, the new independent program to prevent and address maltreatment in sport, Tennis Canada completed a review of our existing Code of Conduct to ensure alignment with the Universal Code of Conduct to Prevent and Address Maltreatment in Sport (UCCMS) and raise awareness for our independent Mechanism.

Team Canada Crowned Davis Cup Champions



It's been a long time coming for Team Canada at the Davis Cup. After successfully qualifying for the Finals held in Malaga from November 22 to 27, Team Canada made no mistakes as they took down Germany, Italy and Australia in consecutive order to secure its very first Davis Cup title in 109 years.

Five Canadians selected by captain Frank Dancevic were crowned world champions; Félix Auger-Aliassime (Montréal, QC), Denis Shapovalov (Richmond Hill, ON), Vasek Pospisil (Vernon, BC), Alexis Galarneau (Laval, QC) and Gabriel Diallo (Montréal, QC).

Against Germany in the quarter-finals, Shapovalov dropped the first match in three sets, but Auger-Aliassime won the second. Shapovalov and Pospisil teamed up to win the third decisive doubles match.

Matched up against the tough Italian squad in the semi-finals, Shapovalov again lost by a hair in three sets in the opening match. Team Canada didn't waver, as Auger-Aliassime easily took care of business in the second match and did it again alongside Pospisil in the third match, propelling Canada to the finals.

Australia were the opponents but proved no match for the Canadians as Shapovalov won his opening rubber. Auger-Aliassime sealed the victory with his win in the second match, as neither player dropped a single set.

A long road to the title was made worthwhile as the team made Canada the 16th nation to win one of the world's most prestigious international team tennis competitions, in which 138 countries participated this year.

The triumph automatically qualifies Canada for the 2023 Finals, where they will have a chance to defend the title. Along with Australia (finalist), Italy and Spain, Canada advanced directly to the group stage that gets underway in September. They will be joined by Croatia, France, the United States, Switzerland, Great Britain, Serbia, Chile, South Korea, Sweden, the Netherlands, Finland and the Czech Republic as each country won their Qualifier ties in February.

Team Canada had been knocking at the door in recent years at the Davis Cup, reaching the finals for the first time in history in 2019. Auger-Aliassime, Shapovalov and Pospisil all played pivotal roles in that historic run, but ultimately came up short. With experience on their side this time around, the Canadians made no mistakes with their second opportunity to seize the title.



Team Canada returns to the Billie Jean King Cup Finals



In April, Canada qualified for the Billie Jean King Cup Finals by Gainbridge for the second straight year with a win over Latvia. As one of the 12 countries battling for the title in Glasgow, Scotland, Team Canada was powered by Leylah Annie Fernandez (Laval, QC), Bianca Andreescu (Mississauga, ON), Rebecca Marino (Vancouver, BC), Carol Zhao (Vaughan, ON) and Gabriela Dabrowski (Ottawa, ON). Despite an initial win over Italy, the squad fell 2-1 to eventual champion Switzerland in the last tie of the group stage.



ATP Cup Champions

The ATP Cup victory at the beginning of the 2022 season was a clear precursor to the success that lied ahead for Team Canada. The quadrumvirate of Auger-Aliassime, Shapovalov, Brayden Schnur and Steven Diez defeated Spain 2-0 in the final of the ATP Cup to crown Canada as champions.

The ATP Cup was inaugurated in 2020, and it was announced that it would be shut down following the 2022 edition – making Canada the third and final winner of the short-lived tournament. Serbia took it home in 2020 and Russia claimed the honour in 2021.

Sixteen countries took part in the 2022 ATP Cup. Canada came out on top of its initial group, topping the United States, Great Britain and Germany. In the knockout stage, they edged out a tight win against Russia in the semifinals in three matches. In the final, Auger-Aliassime and Shapovalov each won their respective matches to defeat Spain.



The 2022 tennis season was highlight-filled for Canadian tennis fans. A maiden Davis Cup title was the crowning achievement, but there were plenty of success stories on both the WTA and ATP Tours throughout the year. By the close of the season, Félix Auger-Aliassime was the top-ranked Canadian at No. 6 in singles with Gabriela Dabrowski just one place back at No. 7 in doubles. In total, 39 titles were won on the professional circuits by Canadians - 18 singles and 21 doubles.

Auger-Aliassime at the Nitto ATP Finals

On the heels of a strong 2022 season in which he raised his first four ATP winner's trophies (three of which he won consecutively in the whirlwind of an impressive 16-match winning streak), Auger-Aliassime punched his ticket to the Nitto ATP Finals in Turin, Italy. Even though he made an exit at the end of the group stage, his participation represents a major achievement since it marked the Quebecer's very first appearance at the renowned year-end championships. The 22-year-old closed the year out at a career-high ranking of World No.6. In 2022, he chalked up wins over the likes of No.1 Carlos Alcaraz, No.2 Rafael Nadal, No.5 Novak Djokovic, No.7 Andrey Rublev, No. 12 Alexander Zverev, No.14 Cameron Norrie and No.15 Jannik Sinner.

Five Canadians in the Top 50

Five Canadians ended the season in the ATP or WTA Top 50. On the men's side, joining No.6 Auger-Aliassime was No.18 Shapovalov, who competed in two ATP finals in 2022 and the quarterfinals of the Australian Open last January. In the WTA, Fernandez (winner in Monterrey 2022) was World No.40 in singles, and Andreescu No.45. In doubles, Dabrowski ended the season at No.7 after taking home three titles in 2022, including the prestigious Mutua Madrid Open WTA 1000 crown. She also competed in the WTA Finals in doubles and won her third Peachy Kellmeyer Player Service Award, an award given by the WTA in recognition of her work in supporting her colleagues and the tour initiatives.

A special nod goes to Marino, who wrapped up 2022 as World No.65. It was a meteoric rise from No.144 in January for the woman who found her way back to pro tennis in 2017 after a four-year hiatus. In 2011, she hit a career-high ranking of No.38.



Canadians excel at home

Canadian tournaments have always aimed to help propel our Canadian athletes to new heights, and they certainly achieved that mission in 2022 as three homegrown heroes took the top honours at Challenger events across the country. Sixteen-year-old Victoria Mboko was the first Canadian to be crowned when she won her very first pro title at the Saskatoon Challenger in July. In August, Diallo also collected his first professional winner's trophy at the Granby National Bank Championships. Pospisil won his second Challenger of the year in Drummondville in November after earning the title in Quimper (France) earlier in the season.

Wheelchair Tennis: Rob Shaw continues to shine

Ontario's Rob Shaw had another stellar year, finishing No.7 in the world rankings in the quad division. This season, he won 6 titles which earned him an invitation to the NEC Wheelchair Singles Masters and the ITF Wheelchair Doubles Masters. He became the first Canadian player to qualify for this prestigious tournament since Sarah Hunter in 2004.



National Tennis Centre Presented by Rogers

Tennis Canada is proud to present the members of the 2022–2023 class at the National Tennis Centre (NTC) presented by Rogers. Since its creation in 2007, the NTC has hosted some 60 players from across the country and built a proven track record that has helped its alumni reach the highest levels in professional tennis.

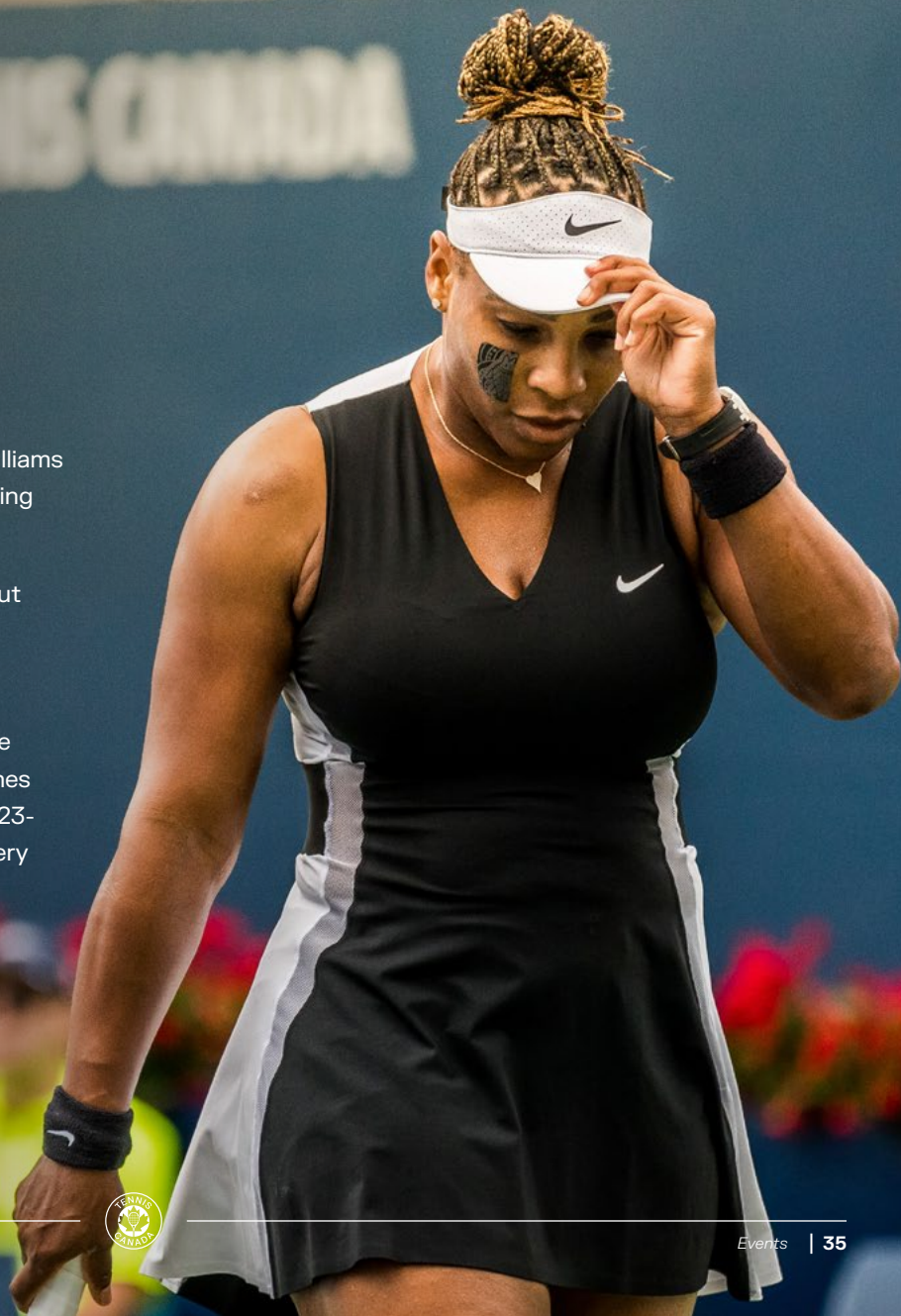

Tennis Canada is coming off a record-breaking year in 2022 for corporate partnerships. With the National Bank Open presented by Rogers finally returning to full capacity for the first time since 2019, the organization signed a record 15 new partners that joined our incredible list of existing partners to create an outstanding fan experience on our tournament sites in Montreal and Toronto.

Notwithstanding this record year for the National Bank Open, there were also many highlights that stemmed from the collaboration between Tennis Canada and its sponsors.

National Bank Play Your Court Program

Tennis Canada joined forces with National Bank to officially launch the National Bank Play Your Court Program, which aims to make tennis more accessible to all Canadians by revitalizing outdoor community tennis courts. Funded by the National Bank, the initiative provides \$3 million to revitalize more than 100 courts by 2030. The first four courts to be revitalized through this program are located at Morris Kerbel Park in Brampton, Ontario.

It announced the first four projects launched as part of the Year-Round Community Tennis Courts Program presented by Rogers. The cities of Markham (ON), Ancaster (ON) and Calgary (AB) recently inaugurated their new public indoor tennis facilities, and work is currently underway in Waterloo (QC) on courts that are expected to open during the 2023–2024 season.



Unveiling of Sobeys Stadium in Toronto



Empire and Tennis Canada were thrilled to announce an exciting expansion of their partnership, unveiling Sobeys Stadium in Toronto. Hosting one of the top tennis tournaments in the world, the National Bank Open presented by Rogers, the newly named Sobeys Stadium is a multipurpose sports and entertainment complex, spread over 15 acres and located in York, just north of Toronto.

A natural extension of Sobeys commitment to the powerful connection between food, family and sport, this partnership with Tennis Canada will celebrate Canada's top tennis athletes and create local child and youth tennis programming for years to come. Sobeys will also continue to collaborate on new grassroots programs to support the growth of tennis in Canada and create more opportunities for families to connect on the court.

Team Canada Presented by Sobeys Wins the Davis Cup

In November, Team Canada presented by Sobeys defeated Australia 2-0 in the championship tie of the 2022 Davis Cup Finals to clinch the nation's first title at the prestigious international event, ending the country's 109-year wait. Playing out of the Palacio de Deportes Jose Maria Martin Carpena in Malaga, Spain, Félix Auger-Aliassime (Montréal, QC), Denis Shapovalov (Richmond Hill, ON), Vasek Pospisil (Vernon, BC), Alexis Galarneau (Laval, QC), Gabriel Diallo (Montréal, QC), and Team Captain Frank Dancevic (Niagara Falls, ON) had a week to remember, ousting both Germany and Italy in tight 2-1 ties before sweeping Australia in the finals.

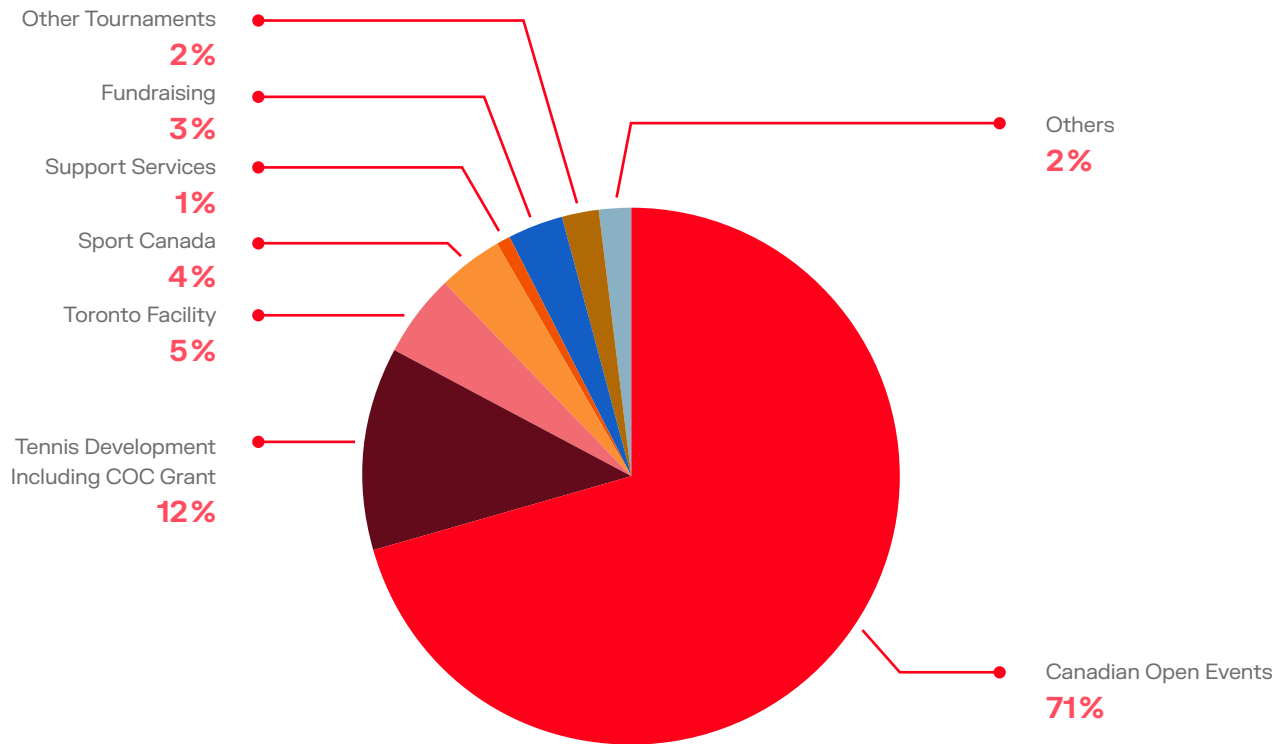

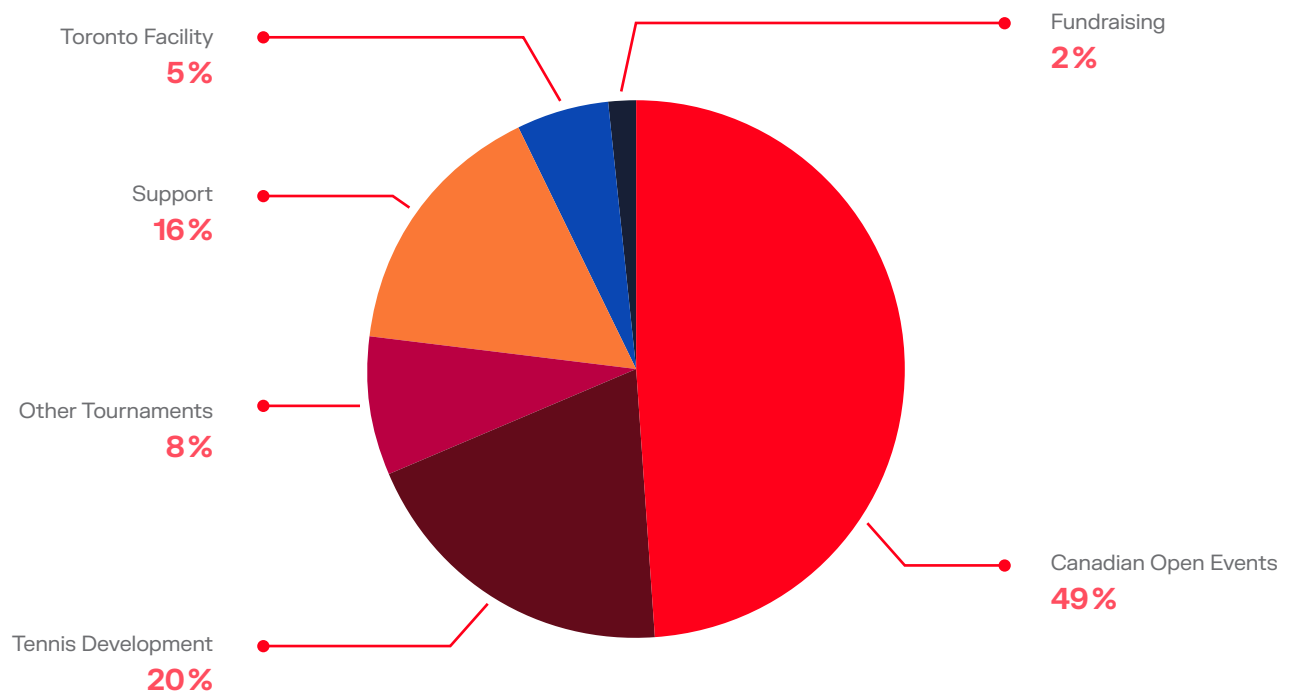

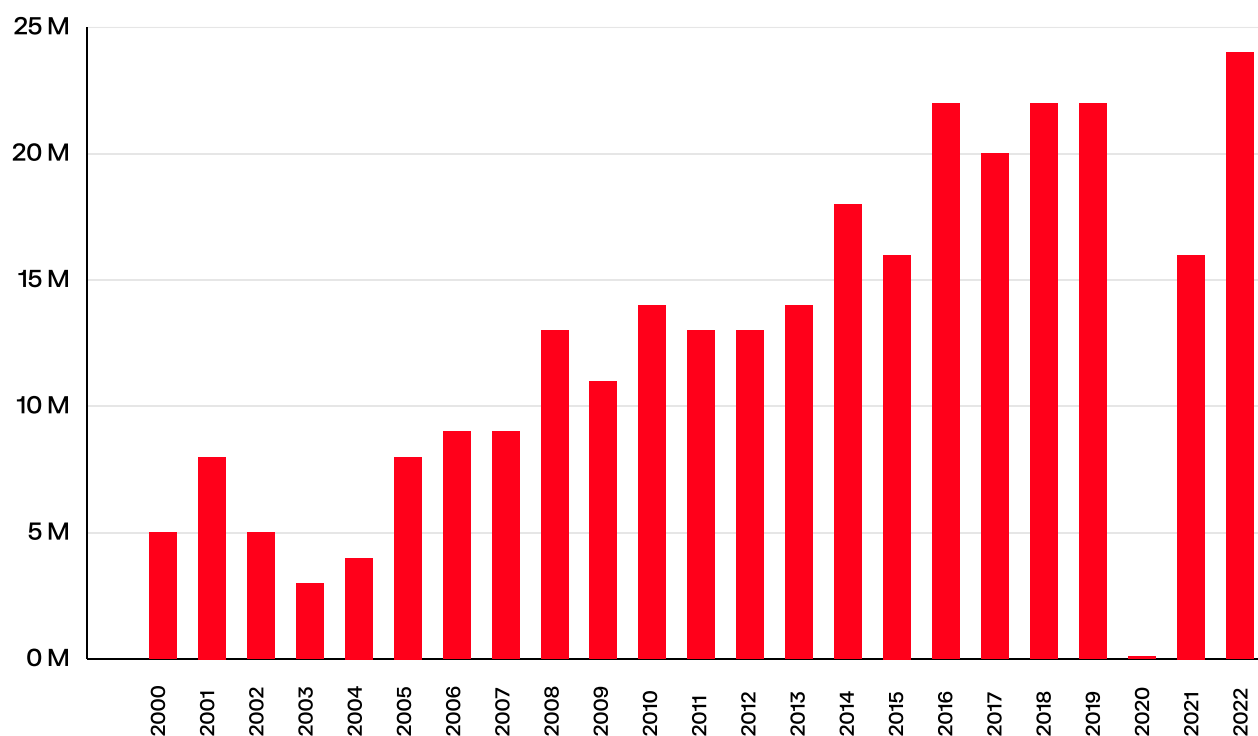
Total Revenue



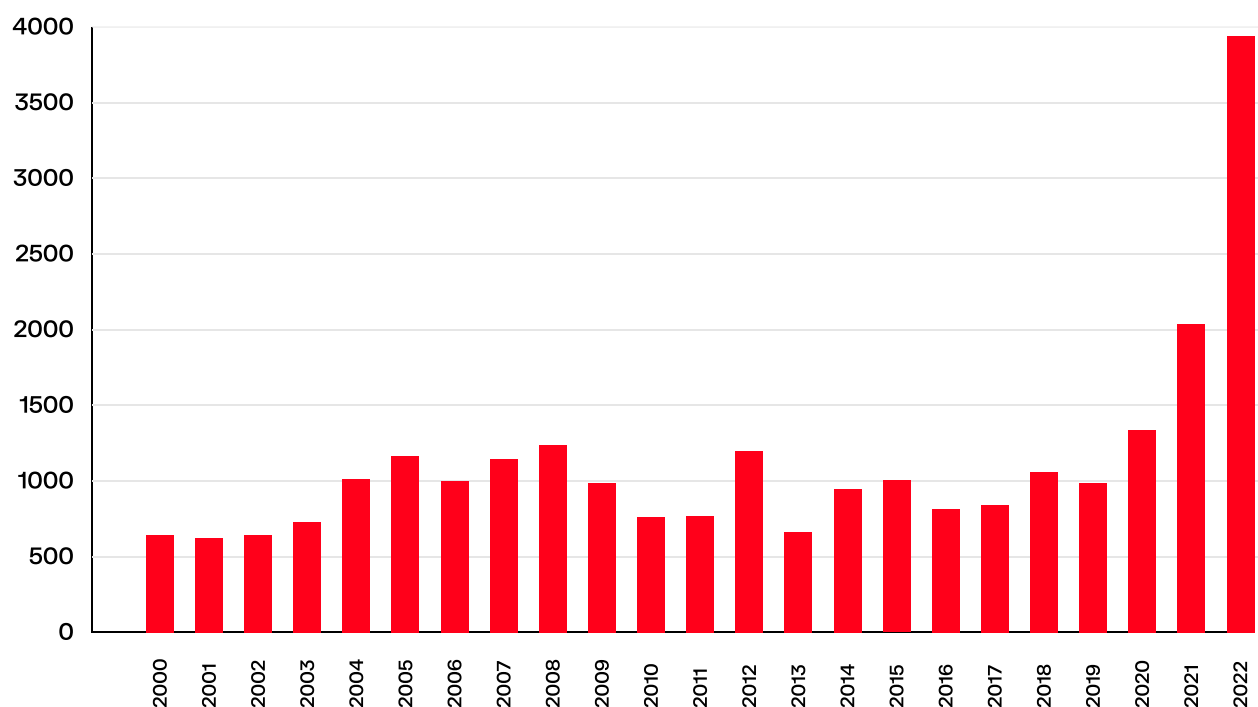

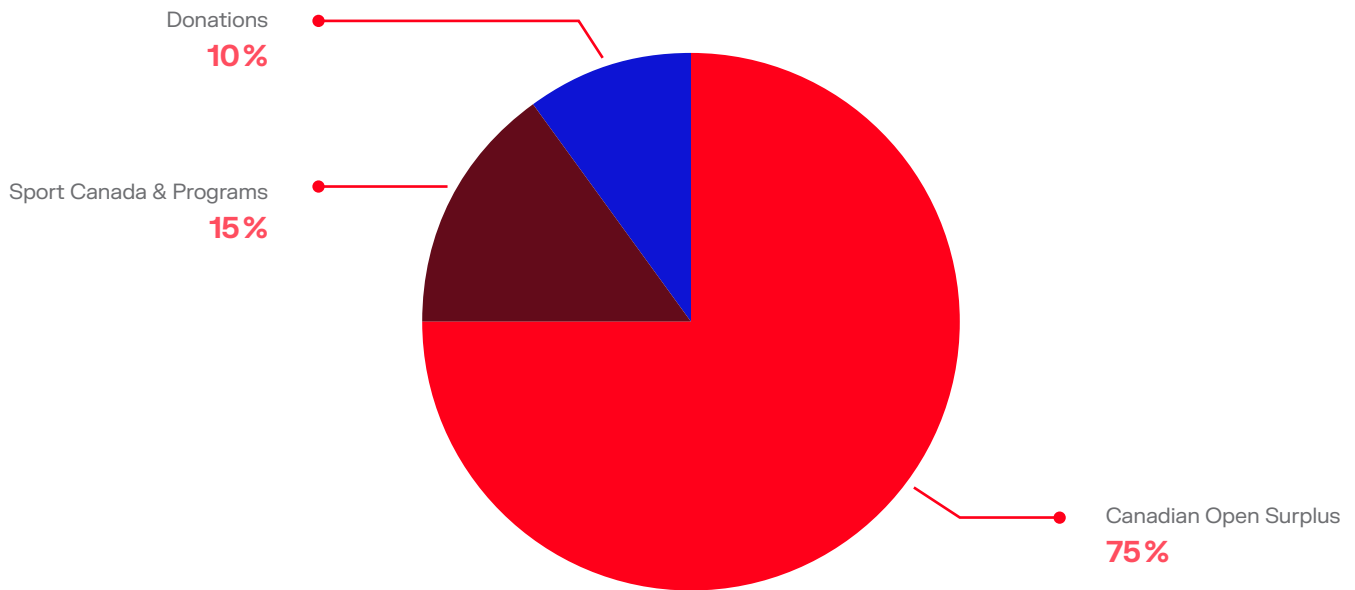


Canadian Open Surplus (in Millions)

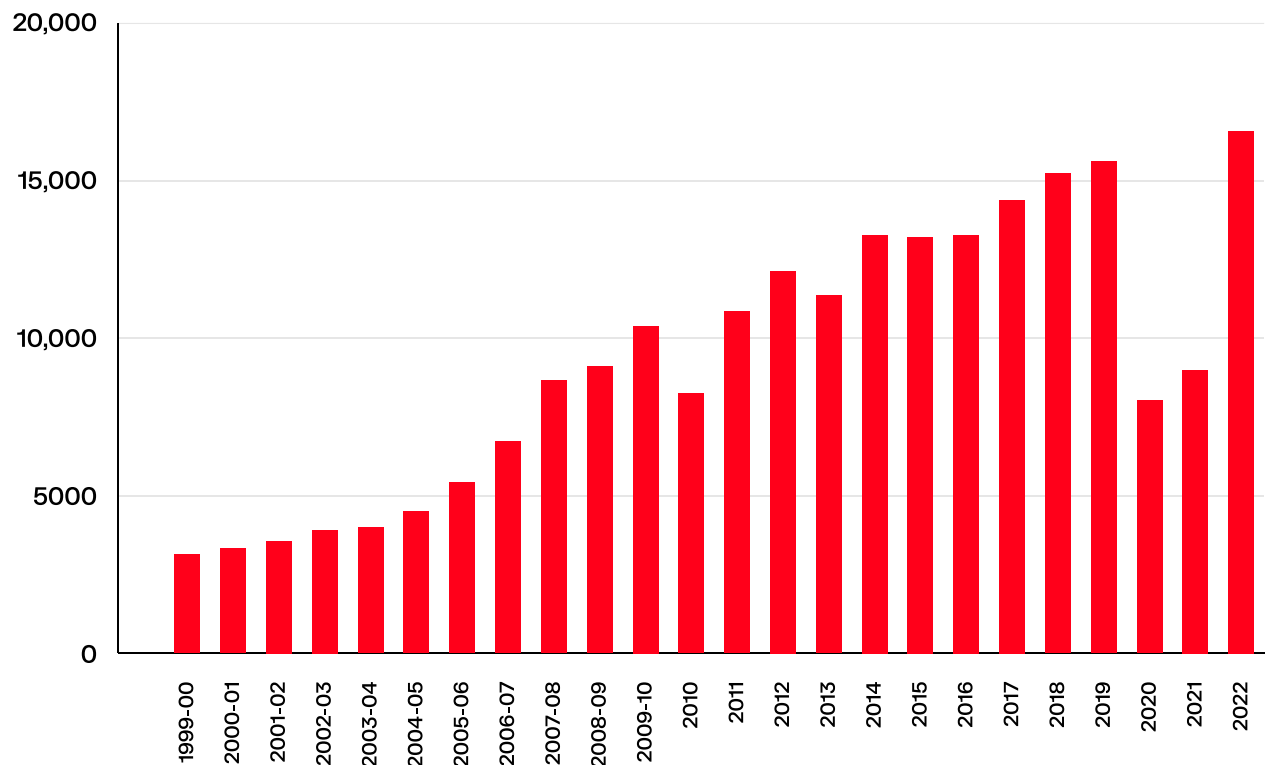


Sport Canada Funding (in Thousands)
